From now on, visitors can navigate the Atlas in the 24 official languages of the European Union, as well as explore a wide range of popular marine topics, such as tourism, litter, environment, energy, aquaculture, and much more!

With the newest release, users of the European Atlas of the Seas now have access to **the most detailed background map available worldwide**. Provided by EMODnet Bathymetry, this new World Base Layer Service enables visitors to view high-resolution representations of seabed features all over the world from their own computer.

EMODnet is crucial to the success of the European Atlas of the Seas. **Our network provides about 135 maps, making EMODnet the main data provider of the Atlas.** Since September 2017, the EMODnet Secretariat has taken over the management of the Atlas and released a revamped version in 2018, with a vision to amplify the visibility of this exciting and valuable resource.
